Attainment of Children and Young People in Hampshire Schools and Post-16 settings







Context

- The impact of the pandemic varied across schools
- Attendance
- Data should not be compared to 2019 or used to compare schools' performance (DfE)
- Increase in pupils experiencing disadvantage in Hampshire
- Impact of HIAS on outcomes
- 93% of Hampshire schools judged to be good or better by Ofsted



Primary Attainment



- Attainment at the end of the Foundation Stage (age 5) remains well above the national figure.
- Attainment at the end of Key Stage 1 (age 7) remains above the national figure in each of reading, writing and mathematics.
- Attainment at Key Stage 2 (age 11) is above the national figure in the key measure of reading, writing and mathematics combined.
- Key Stage 2 reading and writing are above the national figure and mathematics is in line with national attainment.



Next Steps in Primary Schools



- Annual visits in person and focused on pupil achievement.
- Sharing good practice and lessons learnt from focused visits to schools.
- Assessment training for all schools
- Phonics training sessions.
- Targeted arithmetic and problem solving training.
- Training for headteachers on core school improvement activities.



Secondary Attainment



- Attainment at the end of the Key Stage 4 (age 16) remains above the national figure for the Basics (English and maths) at grade 4+.
- Attainment 8, the broadest attainment measure for the end of Key Stage 4 showed Hampshire pupils to achieve in line with those nationally, but, due to exceptionally strong performance at the end of primary education, the progress score relative to national dipped.
- The Ebacc, a key measure of attainment at the end of Key Stage 4, showed the average grade achieved in Hampshire to remain above national.



Next Steps in Secondary Schools

 Annual visits in person, returning to a clear focus on pupil achievement, with continued regard to wellbeing, linked strongly to improving outcomes.

OOL IMPROVEMEN

- Sharing good practice and lessons learnt through seminars, CPD opportunities, headteacher briefings and bespoke work.
- Focused project work on exam preparation and success for the 2023 cohort.



Post-16 Attainment



 Attainment at post-16 remains strong with all key performance indicators above national measures for both A level and vocational qualifications.

 The number of young people who either stayed in education or went into employment after finishing KS4 was 95% relative to a national figure of 94%.



Experiencing vulnerability



- Economic disadvantage, open to social care, with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND)
- Changing profile locally; increase in economic disadvantage greater than that nationally
- Impact of weaker teaching is disproportionate they need and deserve the best of teaching
- Impact of pandemic has been to widen educational inequalities; widening gaps nationally and locally
- Learning gap or learning/developmental need?
- Inclusivity attendance, suspensions
